Olga Titus

Born in 1977.

Lives and works in Winterthur.

Olga Titus studied Fine Arts at HSLU in Lucerne. She has received several awards and scholarships for her work.

Olga composes colorful photo collages, animating and digitally transforming them into a series of fictional narratives. His videos, installations and works made with printed sequins present a universe mixing Bollywood aesthetics, folklore, popular culture and video games. Pixels don't just feature prominently in his videos; they are also present in analog form in the glitter paintings, which convey the charm of this tiny world. The sequins are printed double-sided, which means that each pattern hides a second, thus revealing a still unknown world.

Manon Pretto

Born in 1993.

Lives and works between Clermont-Ferrand and Paris.

Manon Pretto is a visual artist, holder of a DNSEP from the École Supérieure d'Art de Clermont Métropole in 2020.

His multidisciplinary work explores the limits between the body and the image. Manon works, among other things, on wandering and how we adapt to our environment. His practice is focused on the world of science fiction for a predominantly urban environment.

She creates prosthetic objects with a futuristic look, to create augmented bodies. Very close to questions linked to individual freedoms and the way in which they can be undermined today, his work questions the fragilities and mechanisms of power.

Arnaud Sancosme

Born in 1995 in Geneva.

Lives and works in Geneva.

A graduate of the Haute école d'art et de design – Genève (HEAD), he developed a practice of painting on canvas mixing figuration and abstraction in vibrant and colorful flat areas. At the end of his studies, he was awarded the Prix des Galeries, which led him to exhibit at the Galerie Joy de Rouvre in Geneva (2021), in the company of Diane Rivoire. Then, he presents his work in various group exhibitions in spaces such as Le Labo and L'Espace Forde (Geneva) or Le Terminus (Renens).

Arnaud Sancosme works in the register of a geometric abstraction referenced according to the postulate that any artistic proposition refers to pre-existing images. Multiplying the iconographic sources borrowed from the personal and public spheres, varying the supports as well as the techniques, he therefore frees himself from the usual codes and chooses a position that is in certain respects libertarian, even poetic, most promising in the face of this revisited heritage, particularly on the stage. artistic French-speaking world, since the 1980s.

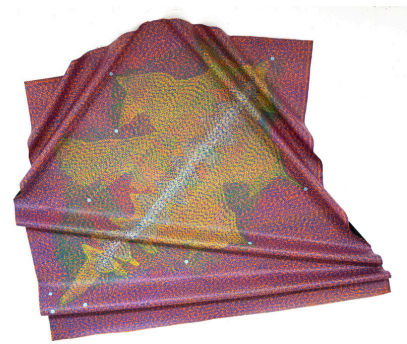
Born in 1980 in Zalivé, Togo.

His painting and installation technique analyzes potential relationships between technology, material and natural resources, expressed through abstract language. In his artistic practice, he studies and explores transformations and new scenarios in contemporary sciences.

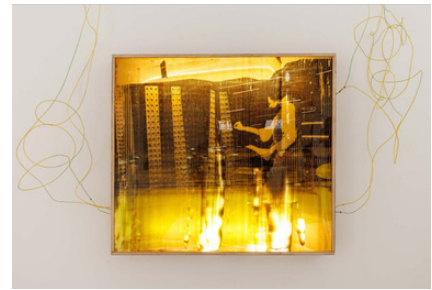
Zoé Tullen

Born in Geneva in 1993.

Lives and works between Geneva and Paris.

Graduated from EnsAD (École nationale supérieure des Arts Décoratifs, Paris) in 2019, her work has been exhibited in various independent spaces as well as in institutional spaces such as the Galerie du Sauvage (2016-17, CH), the Galerie le Cœur (2017, FR), the Pernod Ricard Foundation (2020, FR), the Galerie du Crous (2023, FR) or the Galerie Dix9 (2024, FR).

She was selected for the “Jungkunst” exhibition in Winterthur (2022, CH) as well as at the Salon de Montrouge (2023, FR). Zoé Tullen's artistic practice is inspired by an observation: machines are, along with women, subject to patriarchy by common mechanisms. Whether in physical or virtual volume, his three-dimensional work precisely reveals the “objectification” suffered by these two groups, human and non-human. The evolving series that she began in 2022, *Motherlode* (in French mother lode, or source code) is particularly interested in the historical relationships between women and electronic programming devices.

Claude Cortinovis

Born in 1967 in Geneva.

Lives and works in Geneva.

Gowen Contemporary Gallery.

In 1991 he obtained a diploma from the Geneva School of Visual Art in “Graphic Expression” in the workshop of Carmen Perrin and an advanced course in “Mixed Media” in the workshop of Silvie Defraoui.

Like the performances, the works of Claude Cortinovis are produced slowly and patiently. The gestures, whether drawing a line, writing a sentence or drawing with tiny ink pads, are repeated, and the technique follows mathematical and temporal patterns predefined by the artist according to constant discipline. After the conception of each work, the time and modalities of its execution become the subjects themselves. The details stand out as vestiges of an irreversible time and offer the artist a highly ordered and precise space of refuge. It is through the infinitely repeated gesture that Claude Cortinovis explores the notion of human existence, its place and its duration in the universe.



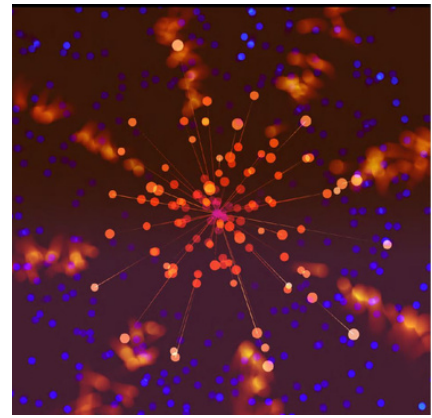

Leo Villareal

Born in 1967 in Albuquerque (USA).
Lives and works in New York.
Pace Gallery

Léo Villareal creates elaborate works of art with LED lights, using custom programming to continuously vary their frequency, intensity and patterns. Villareal's light works encourage us to rethink light, space and technology.

Often inspired by natural phenomena, they evoke, without representing them, elementary and atmospheric systems, with emergent behaviors developing without predefined results. Deeply rooted in abstraction, Villareal's approach uses layered sequencing to create his light sculptures, providing viewers with experiences that are immersive and open to interpretation.

Lucas Samaras

Born in 1936 in Kastoria (Macedonia).
Died in 2024 in New York.
Pace Gallery

A pioneering figure in photography and digital art, Samaras has been at the forefront of these mediums throughout his career, working in the digital realm long before it became associated with contemporary art.

Avoiding any historical categorization, the work of Lucas Samaras is distinguished by its constant attention to the body and the psyche, often putting autobiography to the fore. The themes of self-representation and identity have been a driving force in his practice, which, from its beginnings in the 1960s, advanced surrealist language while proposing a radical departure from the dominant themes of abstract expressionism and pop art.
